THROUGH THE LENS: TANZANIA

Have you ever thought about volunteering abroad? Tanzania could be the perfect place. Each year, hundreds of volunteers from Nord Anglia schools travel here to lend a helping hand.

Tanzania is famous for its natural beauty
—from the Serengeti to Mount
Kilimanjaro. But it's the human
connections forged through service that
leave the most lasting impression for me.

During my trip to Tanzania, I stayed at Camp Shamba Kipara, located along the USA River. This camp is part of the Nord Anglia (NAE) group. At the camp, students can enjoy amenities like a pool, football pitch, lounge area, and a nightly campfire.

We stayed in tents to sleep at night and used communal bathrooms to wash clothes or shower. On my first day exploring Tanzania, I visited a school called Dolly Bush.

However, Dolly Bush has become a lifeline for local families—parents send their children there so they can at least access these needs during the school day. With the school struggling to keep up with growing enrollment, we lent a hand and built an additional classroom for the community.

Over the next few days, I went to a coffee farm in a local village. What made this place special was that they crafted their own coffee and tea blends right on site.



Overall, I would highly recommend the opportunity to volunteer in Tanzania. It's a chance not only to make a difference but also to immerse yourself in the country's natural wonders and vibrant culture. If you're interested in service learning and exploring new horizons, Tanzania should definitely be on your radar. The memories and connections you'll forge will stay with you long after you've returned home.

DRAGONS

What is Dungeons and Dragons?

Dungeons & Dragons (DnD) is a fantasy tabletop role-playing game. In DnD, you and your companions form a party (typically 3-5 players) to embark on epic campaigns, exploring and interacting with meticulously crafted worlds. While most campaigns use pre-made settings, the Dungeon Master (DM) can also craft original adventures, ranging from heroic medieval battles between barbarians and wizards to extraterrestrial encounters with elder gods and space goblins, allowing the DM freedom to weave in rich lore, unique mythologies, and new captivating storylines.

The Role of Dungeon

You may wonder who a 'Dungeon' Master is. Simply put, the DM acts as the conductor of the game, leading players through the narrative without spoiling the fun of solving complex puzzles or tackling challenging obstacles. One of their main jobs is to uphold the rules, ensuring a fair and balanced experience for everyone. However, they also possess the flexibility to improvise when players are stuck, when a dispute arises, or when they they make these encounters seem feel like it will enhance the playing experience (basically, the rule of cool).

For example, decreasing the difficulty of a very hard boss so that the whole party won't die in one hit, or in another turn of events, increasing the difficulty of weak enemies to surprise them.

Beyond being a referee, the DM breathes life into the world in many ways. By carefully creating unique personalities and quirks for enemies and non-player characters (NPCs), more realistic and engaging for players.

Like recreating an image from a story, through evocative descriptions and vibrant environments, the setting is given its own tone and atmosphere, adding to the immersion.

Above all, the DM strives to create a fun and engaging experience for all players as best as they can, because after all, what's the point of playing without having fun?



Before embarking on your first DnD campaign, here's what you'll need. While the game is heavily reliant on using your imagination, some pieces of equipment will provide a smoother and more seamless experience.

- **First up** are polyhedral dice: a set including a D4, D6, D8, D10 (can be used as a percentile die), D12, and lastly a D20 die.
 - Additionally, you will need a character sheet, pencil and an eraser to keep track of your hero's stats and items.
 - **Spellcasters** may want a *spell list* for quick reference.

Also, while knowing the rules is important, don't bother using a rulebook – the DM will help guide you through the rules!"



Character creation:

However, out of all the items from the list above, one component is the most crucial of all: your character! While this may sound super obvious, creating a character is not as easy as it appears, nor is it really complex. To get started quickly, you may choose to use pre-made characters.

They are usually created alongside the campaign itself, therefore are balanced and focused specifically for the campaign; they might also come with *underlying goals*, *motives*, and *backstories* that tie in closely with the story, granting the character more depth and allowing for *interesting roleplays*. On the flip side, if you crave more **customization**, feel free to create your own unique character! After choosing your race, class, and background, there are two main ways to determine your character stats: **the hardcore way** (RNG), and **the safe way** (point buy system).



- Character suggestions: {bard: unique playstyle relying on spells and charisma} Using the point buy system, you have more control and certainty over your stats, allowing you to build them around a certain playstyle. Starting with 27 points, you can use that to exchange for stats, with higher points progressively getting more expensive. The exchange rates are as follows:

Alternatively, if you feel adventurous, you can consider handing your fate to Fortune by rolling the dice. Simply roll 4D6, get rid of the lowest point die, and find the sum of the remaining die. Even though certainty is being sacrificed, this could potentially mean outstandingly high - or dismally low scores. Even with only a bit of uncertainty added, this can unexpectedly create some wild and bizarre combinations!

– notice there is no score that costs 6 points.

Ultimately, the thrill of DnD isn't just in the dice you roll, or the legendary fights you have, but about truly embodying your character! Step into their shoes and bring them to life; imagine your character's personality, their quirks, and their motivations. How would they react in a situation? This kind of immersive play is what creates unforgettable memories and epic stories.

Not to mention, but there are also equipment, proficiencies and race benefits to consider, but since this is only a short introductory guide, I won include them. Instead, I recommend visiting the official "DnDBeyond" website to learn more about character creation.

Why play DnE here?

Personally, when I first came to DnD, my expectations were not that high. I was only familiar with high-action online games, and my limited experience with table-top games came from Monopoly and conquest games like Small World, but a game with only pen and paper – I couldn't understand how I was supposed to visualise the world, let alone have fun. Nonetheless, I convinced myself to give it a try, and to my surprise, I enjoyed it – more than I expected myself to even if things went well.

So, I came back the next semester, and the next, and so it continued like that for some years. For me, its simple rules meant that it was easy to learn, but the combinations of various factors like different races, classes, and backgrounds meant that I could mix and match and never fear my characters would be the same, and even if I replayed the same situations over and over again, there was the inherent factor of sheer chaotic luck that always made encounters seem unique. But the laid-back, relaxed atmosphere was also a huge reason why I enjoyed it, it just seemed like what I needed after the school sessions.

D&D isn't for everyone, and that's perfectly okay! The beauty lies in exploring and discovering activities that spark your joy. But if the idea of collaborative storytelling, epic adventures, and unleashing your creativity intrigues you, give D&D a try! There's no pressure to commit in the long-term, too—just jump in and see if it resonates with and pique your interest.

While our ECA can't capture

While our ECA can't capture the full experience of D&D, especially without its exciting set pieces or giant terrains, it can be a great starting point. We're always looking for likeminded adventurers who want to contribute to the ECA, not just by playing, but by helping it grow.



- The role-playing element may discourage some players, some are not comfortable to speak up and roleplay in front of others - While cooperation and communication are a huge part, you dont need to be social to play: incorporate it as part of your character (a mime: use expressions and body language instead of words, a vampire: hates the sun and chefs that cooks onions)

Don't worry, DnD isn't just for social butterflies! While they are a lively addition to the party, there's plenty of room for quieter, more reserved players too. Maybe you are not comfortable with exaggerated gestures or grand monologues, but that doesn't mean you can't contribute in other ways. You can contribute through thoughtful strategy, clever problem-solving, or even just by embodying your character in unique ways.

Imagine a dwarven rogue, who is also a struggling mime. They can only communicate using expressions and body language and always try to crack jokes at parties and gatherings, only for them to be overlooked- just like their height, which weighs down on them just like their heavy, miserable smile. Who would expect this harmless clown to be a deadly assassin on the battlefield, perfect for covertops and ambushes? Even though this is an overdramatic example, my point is just doing simple things like this goes a long way in building teamwork and fostering a welcoming environment.

THE VANISHING BLACK TEETH SMILE IN VIETNAM

The Black Teeth Smile" is an idiom that captures a tradition deeply embedded in Vietnam's history. It refers to the custom of women dyeing their teeth black. This used to be considered a symbol of beauty for Vietnamese women, especially in Northern Vietnam, during feudal times. This ancient historical tradition is still cherished by some but is slowly dying out.



Late folklore researcher, Ngo Duc Thinh, states that: "this tradition of black teeth dyeing was initiated by beliefs in ghosts, bad spirits, underworld ghouls, and wild animals. Having black teeth was believed to protect you from evil beings and supernatural creatures. Moreover, it was believed that having your teeth dyed black would bring you closer to your predecessors in the afterlife."

In contrast to modern society, superstitious beliefs were popular and well-accepted by the majority of Vietnamese society. Spells and magic amulets were a common practice way to carry good spirits alongside the custom of black teeth dying. Nevertheless, this old-fashioned trend is currently dying out, partially because of different beliefs about the supernatural today and drastic changes in beauty standards. Perhaps now we are more familiar with new beauty trends that emphasize having white, healthy-looking teeth instead of dark-dyed teeth.

While the black teeth dveing formality was famously performed on girls of the Kinh ethnic group, it was practised by some other minorities as well. Girls as young as 13-14 dyed their teeth black, and their teeth remained that way until they died. In certain ethnic groups, girls typically got married at this age, and to be certified as a woman capable of fulfilling the role of a wife—looking mellow and beautiful—they were expected to perform this tradition. Interestingly, people who didn't dye their teeth were considered 'lazy,' as the teeth dyeing process required meticulousness and patience.

The tube is covered with a cast iron plate, and as the tube gets hotter, it creates steam, which coats the plate with a black substance ready for dyeing teeth. However, before applying the substance, the person must chew and rinse their teeth with a type of rice wine-lemon juice mixture to prepare the surface of the teeth for dyeing. This is typically very painful because lemon juice is acidic, and repeatedly rinsing the teeth with it can erode the tooth enamel and even make the gums swollen.

However, dyeing your teeth black isn't a painless process. According to the local girls at the Pa Pe hamlet, Hoa Binh commune, women make vegetable dyes for their teeth from a special local plant, which is hung to dry and burnt to coals. This substance is then put into a bamboo tube and placed next to the fire stove.

Thus, a woman should be proud of having black teeth because it symbolizes beauty and represents her femininity and perseverance.

Surprisingly, even in today's world, it is remarkable that this tradition endures, although it isn't as popular and widespread as before.

Nowadays, it is more common to see older people from past generations with black teeth, as the trend is dying out. Therefore, its remnants should be seen as a unique hallmark of Vietnamese cultural heritage that needs to be cherished, protected, and preserved for future generations.
























































GAME CHANGERS

Meet CHAMELLIA, the student-led project founded by Minh Phuong (12I) and Vuong Binh (12S) in July 2023 with the aim of promoting bilingualism.

Our end goal is to inspire young children in need and ignite their passion for English as well as learning languages by providing valuable opportunities for students in rural areas, exposing them to the English language through fun and exciting lessons that are made and taught by CHAMELLIA team members.

With the help of our Head of Departments - Thanh Mai, Ha Anh (12S), Minh Chau, Kim Lan (12B), Van Khue (12V) - CHAMELLIA has successfully formed a team of 31 members with 5 different departments: human resources, finance, public relations, logistics, media-design and content.

Our team had the opportunity to connect with Thac Ba Primary School in Yen Bai. Determined to see the school firsthand, we decided to do a scouting trip to Yen Bai to understand their potential and challenges better. The school was struggling with technological materials, but that doesn't stop the students from being such curious learners. This discovery fueled our passion, which is to ignite a passion for English in these young students through fun, practical lessons and to equip the school with better resources. We believed that improving the school's overall quality of education, especially in English, could make an impact towards the children, their family and the whole community.



After five months of meticulous planning, fundraising, and organising, CHAMELLIA successfully launched several fundraising activities. These included opening donation gates and holding food sales sessions at BVIS. Through grit and determination, our collective efforts paid off, and we were able to raise an impressive amount of money to enhance the educational experience at Thac Ba Primary School. With these funds, we were able to provide: 850 notebooks, 410 pens, 6 TVs (which will assist us with our 8 online lessons), and 100+ donated storybooks.

We were able to visit Thac Ba Primary School on two separate occasions. During these visits, the CHAMELLIA crew conducted engaging and interactive **English lessons that were met** with enthusiasm and curiosity from the students, despite having little experience with the language. As we held a wholeschool tug of war competition between the classes, we found ourselves enjoying our bonding moments with the kids. We were also shocked at the amount of students asking for our... autographs. Each member would be preoccupied, having to sign for an endless wave of students that only started thinning out near the end of the breaktime. Regardless, we were very grateful for the warm reception from both students and teachers who have welcomed us with such kindness and hospitality and made every minute we spent there truly memorable.

A GUIDE TO SURVIVE Thien Bao NGUYEN (108)

The Duke of Edinburgh Award consists of four key sections that you'll need to complete for at least 52 hours of.

As a participant, you will record these activities using any kind of sports app or anything of sort, and you can log in your activity daily on an app called "ORB Participant."

- 1. Volunteering: This section encourages you to give back to your community by dedicating time to a meaningful cause or service. You'll have the opportunity to develop empathy, leadership, and organizational skills as you contribute to making a positive difference.
- 2. Physical: Staying physically active is one of the most important parts. You'll be required to engage in regular physical activity, such as sports, fitness classes, or outdoor pursuits, to improve your overall health and well-being.
- 3. Skills: This section allows you to explore and cultivate a new skill or develop an existing one. Whether it's learning a musical instrument, coding, or even public speaking, you'll have the chance to expand your horizons and discover hidden talents.
- 4. Expedition: Perhaps the most iconic and challenging aspect of the Duke of Edinburgh is the expedition component. You'll team up with your peers to plan and execute a self-sufficient journey through the great outdoors, navigating rugged terrain, setting up camp, and relying on your survival skills.

<u>Part 1:</u> <u>Gear up for the</u> <u>Bronze challenge</u>

U tilizing the right equipment can make all the difference between a grueling trip across hell and an unforgettable expedition, trust me as I have experienced this first-hand! Even a wrong size shoe can be hellish and torture you for the duration of the trip.

When it comes to tackling DoE Bronze Award, spending more time and investing in high-quality, versatile gear is vital to facing the elements.

Stores:

Shops that sell sports equipment should be able to provide you with these. I recommend Decathlon, it's high quality and they even have a store near school in Royal City.

I. The backpack

Choose a sturdy, well-fitted backpack with a supportive frame, and plenty of organizational pockets.

Look for one that fits your body, adjustable straps and a waist belt are lifesavers as it can help distribute the weight evenly, effectively saving you from receiving old people back 40 years too early.





III. Navigation Essentials

In addition to a detailed map of your route, be sure to bring a reliable compass, and consider actually learn how to use it **



II. Sleeping

Staying warm and well rested is key, so get yourself a sleeping bag rated for diverse temperatures as well as making sure it's waterproof. You don't want to find yourself sleeping in a soaking wet bed if the tent leaks. Most importantly make sure it's portable, not too heavy but not too small.



IV. Light

Bringing along a light source can make traversing the mountain an easy task. Pack multiple light sources, such as flashlights, glow sticks, or even headlights.





V. Clothing and weather protection

The DoE challenge requires rugged, versatile clothing that can withstand the expedition. For the base layer, breathable, moisture-wicking fabrics are a must. Brands like *Gu Outdoors* and *Spa Mountain Sports* offer excellent thermal clothing options made from quick-drying synthetic blends. This will keep you dry even if they're soaked with sweat. On top, a sturdy, water-resistant jacket is essential. Look for something with a Goretex or similar breathable part, like the one made by local brand *Dalat Outdoors* To complete the outer layer, you'll need weatherproof pants. Tikaton in Hanoi has a great selection of technical hiking trousers crafted from reinforced nylon or polyester fabrics. Proper footwear is critical for tackling rugged terrain; you should invest in a pair of high-quality hiking boots from the brand Salomon. Look for boots with excellent traction, ankle support, and waterproofing. Clothing is a basic essential for outdoor camping, a prepararuon you'll quickly regret skimping on esse.

VI. Cooking kit

Though the school will provide this, learning the use of a Trangia, which is a portable cooking kit that contain as many pots and pans as a kitchen does. The fear of flying, or aerophobia, is a common phobia that affects millions of people worldwide.



Firstly, it is essential to point out that airplanes are by far the safest mode of transportation. With a death per million miles ratio so minor, it does not show on the chart.

The tiny dark blue area in the third column represents the figure at 0.01 deaths/million miles, which, compared to other modes of transportation, looks like a drop of water in an ocean. Infact, there were 8 years where scheduled airlines had 0 deaths per million miles.


Furthermore, the reliability of pilots, and aircrafts is dependable. With the expertise and thousands of hours in intensive training of pilots, they are proficient and well-equipped with information of every possible scenario of an accident, ensuring a safe and risk-free environment for the passengers on board. Coupled with modern and redundant aircrafts of today, an accident such as those in the 90s are highly improbable. Even if a malfunction happens, pilots are sufficiently supplied with knowledge and skills to land the plane without any casualties.

BUT.. how do airplanes fly in the first place?


Well, all flying things such as birds and places all use Bernoulli's principle, in which states that the air moving in the upper side of the wing moves faster then the underside thus creating less pressure, this inturn produces lift that propel the aircraft upwards.




But to do this, the aircraft must be traveling at high speeds and this is where the engine comes into play. The loud sounds you hear before going airborne is the engine roaring in all its might, accelerating, pushing, shoving the aircraft forwards and upwards.

But what about the scary looking extensions on the wing? There are 3 main parts of the wing: the Flaps, the Slats, and the spoilers. The Flaps and Slats typically appear during take-off and landing, with its purpose being, reducing the speed required and slowing the plane down for take-off and landing respectively. Otherwise, runways would have to be twice as long, or around 10 kilometers, to compensate for a slightly shorter wing. Speaking of slowing the plane down, the spoiler does exactly that, by increasing the surface area on the wing, it creates more drag and decelerates the aircraft rapidly during landing. But that alone is not enough to halt the plane, this is where the reversers come into play. By redirecting the thrust of the engines to spew the hot air backwards, the engines produce a backwards thrust that slows the planes down efficiently.

Another factor for Aerophobia is the weather. Turbulence, storms, hurricanes and strong winds pose a dangerous threat to aircrafts and the people onboard. For example the Madeira airport of Portugal, often has winds so fierce and intense that planes have to approach the runway diagonally to land. In simpler terms, imagine facing North but traveling North-East. Though these gusty winds pose a frightening threat, Pilots have gone through rigorous training to be able to counteract this menacing force of nature, and autopilot systems can reliably land the plane without breaking a sweat.



Hell Vision: Empowering Women in Vietnam

Our student-led ECA called "Her Vision" aims to prevent violence against women in Vietnam and inspire the next generation of female leaders. We collaborated with the non-profit organization "Hope Box" to understand their services to survivors of gender-based violence (GBV).

Hope Box was founded in 2018 as Vietnam's first social enterprise dedicated to addressing the country's lack of support for GBV survivors. Their goal is to help Vietnamese women who have experienced GBV get a fresh start. They offer a six-month program that includes secure housing, employability skills training, personal development counseling, and access to crucial support agencies.

Our ECA and Hope Box's initiatives go beyond individual empowerment. They also address societal norms that enable violence against women by raising awareness and advocating for gender equality within school communities. Given Vietnam's alarmingly high GBV rates, this collaborative effort aims to educate students and provide them with insights into real-world problems and their detrimental impacts.



Problems in Vietnam

Women in Vietnam face an alarming epidemic of gender-based violence (GBV). Staggering statistics reveal that 63% of Vietnamese women have experienced physical, sexual, emotional, or economic abuse from their husbands at some point in their lives, with 32% enduring such violence within the last year alone.

Tragically, the vast majority, a devastating 90% never reported these abuses. The roots of this violence run deep, as it is often a learned behavior passed down through generations.

GBV remains the largest threat to Vietnamese women's well-being, limiting their educational and employment opportunities.

Survivors of GBV often lack access to the critical resources necessary for regaining independence and financial stability - safe housing, employability skills training, and traumainformed support services. Organizations like HopeBox are stepping in to fill this vital gap. We interviewed Linh from HopeBox to better understand GBV and the solutions to overcome GBV in Vietnam.

What are some of the challenges women face when trying to get help after experiencing violence in Vietnam?

Women often leave home with no belongings and do not know how to report violence or where to go for help. They also do not want to leave their family responsibilities, like looking after their children.

Subjected to violence by her husband for many years. HopeBox helped her to recover by developing her skills. This enabled her to get a job as a manager in a hotel. She now earns a salary that allows her to raise her children on her

What are some of the attitudes or beliefs in Vietnamese society that contribute to violence against women?

In Vietnam, men are often valued more than women. Some men therefore think of women as less. Women are also often financially dependent on men.

What kind of help and support does HopeBox provide to women who have experienced violence in Vietnam?

We run a kitchen to help train women to develop food products like cookies. These are sold and the revenue goes back into the organization to support other programmes for women. There are programmes that last 1-3 months where women and housed and trained so they can recover and start their lives independently after the programme has finished.



How do women usually find out about and connect with HopeBox's services?



Women find out about HopeBox's service through the television or friends and families. Sometimes, they also hear about HopeBox through partners like Blue Dragon.

BOOK REVIEW:SPLINTERS OF SUNSHINE


Available in the school library
